

FROM THE CEO

Change.

Change is a constant. We always are in the midst of some change. Change can be minor and gradual or it can be abrupt and disruptive. Some changes we choose to make and some changes are imposed upon us. I want to let you know about potential changes impacting the Colorado intellectual and developmental disabilities service system and how the changes might effect Starpoint.

The agency that oversees Medicaid at the federal level is called CMS. That agency passed a rule a few years ago that prohibits an agency that provides direct services from also providing case management. This rule, if fully enforced, would require Colorado to develop a completely new system structure for intellectual and developmental disiabilities. Starpoint is one of twenty Community Centered Boards in Colorado and all of the CCBs provide both direct services and case management. In the large metro areas many of the CCBs also have service agencies that provide the direct support services so the CCB can continue to be the case management entity. In rural areas like ours we do not have service agencies and so we are the only source for service delivery and case management. CMS has provided for "rural exemptions" to the rule and Starpoint hopes to be granted such an exemption so we can maintain our current operations.

The 2017 Colorado legislature passed HB17-1343 that requires the state to take steps to comply with the CMS conflict free case management rule. However, it has a provision that permits us to apply for a rural exemption and maintain services as currently provided. If CMS does not grant the waiver we will have to turn over case management to another organization. We will explore the option of starting our own case management agency, but as a completely independent organization not under the control of Starpoint. The next year will see us evaluating whether we must change. We will keep you informed.



Another federal issue that will require change is referred to as the "Settings Rule." This rule mandates that all services. residential, vocational, and day programs, give the people in services increased integration in the community and to have the daily life activities that people without disabilities experience. Starpoint may have to restructure our day services. Another aspect of the rule requires we put in place measures to assure that people in residential services have increased control over the places where they live. We endorse the rule and the intention and underlying values behind the rule. It may require that we modify some of our programs. Again as this moves forward we will keep you informed of how it may impact you and your family members.

The U.S. House of Representatives recently passed the Affordable Health Care Act (AHCA.) Within this legislation there is a huge cut to Medicaid of twenty-five percent of total funding over a ten year period. The majority of Starpoint's funding is Medicaid so such a large cut could greatly reduce services. Some of the cuts may also reduce funding for early childhood services and possibly Head Start. The legislation still has a long path before it is law, but because of the potential for major loss of funding we will follow this carefully. The Colorado Constitutional amendment passed in 2016 requires the minimum wage to rise to \$12.00/hour by 2020. Starpoint compliance with the required increase will cause a significant stress to our budget in both the adult services as well as children's services. We will be looking for ways to be more efficient and lean in the way we operate.

Finally, I come to a change that Starpoint has initiated and that we embrace. We continue to expand the principles of "Person Centered Thinking" (PCT) in the way we design services and in the ways that those we serve get to choose what is most important for them as they build their service plans. The PCT approach is a national movement primarily referring to adult services. Starpoint children's services have long used a similar methodology in the involvement of families in service planning. We hope to grow and expand or use of this best practice.

As you can see this is a time of change and challenge for Starpoint. Throughout the next couple of years we will do our best to minimize disruption and stay focused on what is best for those we serve.

Let go of things you can't change, Focus on things you can.

Adult Services Canon City, Salida, Denver

Starpoint, the community centered board for Fremont, Chaffee and Custer counties, has coordinated services and supports for people with developmental disabilities and their families since 1977. Since 1989, Starpoint has also coordinated a network of services and supports for families with young children with and without disabilities, birth to school age which further supports the mission adopted by Starpoint. Starpoint also provides residential and day services in several counties in the Denver area.

Starpoint makes every effort to develop partnerships with other community organizations. Services of the area DVR are utilized; consumers are linked to volunteer opportunities in the area, such as the Boys and Girls Club, Loaves and Fishes, Meals on Wheels, Habitat for Humanity, local nursing homes, churches and service organizations. Monthly meetings with the local mental health agency occur to better serve the needs of consumers who receive services from both agencies. Starpoint continues to actively consider serving individuals from other CCBs via the RFP process. These include day program services, home health services, and lifeline alert services. Consumers are offered a variety of job opportunities through Starpoint's Supported Employment program and are encouraged to participate in a variety of day and social activities in the community. Starpoint works closely with other agencies within our respective cities such as local convalescence centers and hospice so that consumers can come home as soon as possible to either complete their healing in their home or to be home with their families or host home families during critical times of their lives. Working with these agencies limits the time that people are in institutional settings, such as hospitals and nursing homes and they can receive medical care in their home which, as with most of us, might be their preference.

Starpoint has a history of collaboration with public education and served four students this year, 18 to 21 years of age, under contract with two local school districts. Also the Administrative Units for three districts contract with Starpoint to identify children birth to three years of age for Part C eligibility. Starpoint collaborates with all local services and supports agencies to ensure that appropriate state-funded services are utilized. Starpoint meets with the Department of Human Services on a monthly basis to discuss specific cases that have a need that has not been met yet and to determine which agencies may offer supports in those areas.

Starpoint monitors services and supports provided directly by the agency to ensure provision of the highest quality services. Starpoint Adult Services has continued to receive good survey results from the Division of Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities as well as Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment, receiving licensure and program approval in all adult services program areas. Efforts are continuously made to provide a wide variety of services to meet the changing needs of the people to whom Starpoint provides services. In order to keep abreast of those changing needs, satisfaction surveys are traditionally provided to families and consumers with that collected data used to continuously improve the agency's programs and supports. Additionally, the Early Childhood Connections/Part C program has each year since data has been maintained by DHS achieved a determination of "meets requirements".Starpoint has continued to provide services for people who present on-going challenges to be successful in maintaining the lifestyle of their choice – be they individuals with offending behaviors or other significant needs. Starpoint has prevented the institutionalization of many individuals who would otherwise be incarcerated or placed in a more restrictive non-

community based setting and has successfully enrolled six individuals into Comprehensive Services from other communities. Starpoint Adult Services has expanded their PCA program to include staffed homes in order to support people in seven different houses to live as they choose in the community. In addition, Starpoint has worked with the Department of Human Services to provide Foster Care transition services for young people to provide support services for youth aging out of the foster system. Individualized settings have been developed based on needs and preferences within comprehensive services in both the host home and PCA services. Both Host Home and PCA settings enable people to live in the least restrictive settings possible within their community, whereas otherwise they might require a more restrictive environment and be forced to leave their home community. Thus far, these support systems have been positive and the people live in the community, which is their goal, as well as ours.

This year has been busy with a record number of new referrals for individuals seeking services for the first time and several transfers to our region as individuals continue to choose to move into Fremont, Chaffee and Custer County. Case Managers have increased enrollment into the Children's Extensive Support Program to serve children with high medical and behavioral needs and continue to encourage new providers to move into our area to serve these children. With the elimination of the Supported Living Services waitlist, Starpoint has been able to enroll individuals directly into services without a long wait as previously experienced. This has assisted many families as they transition from the High School setting into adult services without a break in necessary services or supports. With the ability to enroll individuals faster, the providers in the area are reaching capacity. Case Management has reached out to several additional providers in Colorado to encourage them to expand into our catchment areas. This will allow for more choice of providers for the individuals we serve and a diversification of available supports. Though we have yet to have more than one service provider in our area, Case Management will continue to reach out to additional providers and support them to feel confident in an expansion to our area.

Starpoint Case Management currently serves 100 individuals in the Comprehensive program, 68 individuals in the Supported Living Services Program, 6 Children in the Children's Extensive Waiver, 12 individuals in the State program and 50 families in the Family Support Program.

Family Services Support

The purpose of the Family Support Services Program (FSSP) is to assist families who provide at-home care for family members with developmental delays or developmental disabilities. The goal of these services is to ease the financial and emotional strains of having a family member with special needs. FSSP offers limited financial assistance to those who are considered most in need and also offers information and referrals to additional supports for the families.

Family Support funds can help pay for the extraordinary costs of caring for a child or dependent with a developmental delay or developmental disability. The distribution of these funds is overseen by the Family Support Services Council that consists of family members, professionals and interested community members.


Additional funding for the Family Support Program became available in 2014 and Starpoint was able to expand their Family Support Services Program to serve even more families in Fremont, Chaffee and Custer county. The most requested support through this program is funding for Respite services so that families are able to get a needed break to be refreshed to provide the necessary level of care day in and day out for their family members. The state has recognized this, and offered additional funding to meet the needs of the communities across the state. Starpoint currently serves 63 families in the Family Support Program, with new referrals coming every week. We look forward to meeting these new families and supporting them in caring for their family members.

Person Centered Planning and Thinking

Person Centered Planning is an ongoing problem-solving process used to help people with disabilities plan for their future. In person centered planning, groups of people focus on an individual and that person's vision of what they would like to do in the future.

As Starpoint and the State of Colorado concentrate on implementing Person Centered Planning and Thinking (PCT) we are reminded that we have worked with families and consumers to create plans that are truly individualized and have supported consumers to be the strongest voice in their planning team. With PCT practices we now focus that process on an individual's preferences, strengths, needs and desired outcomes and concentrate on finding the balance between what's important TO that person and what's important FOR that person.



Person Centered Planning and Thinking provides:

- A well thought out way to see the whole person, not limited to "fixing what is wrong"
- A set of tools that convey the core belief that all people have gifts to share.
- A way to listen, discover and respond to and support the desired life of the individual
- Tools that help focus on the right questions for supporting a great life
- A new way for organizations to think about how their structure supports people

A number of management staff have participated in PCT training and more sessions will be scheduled, with a goal to have all staff receive initial training in 2015. This approach will be further implemented in Case Management, the service planning process, in direct support services and in daily problem solving with the individual. These principles will guide Starpoint in focusing on the individual and their unique goals.

Bryana Marsicano, Director of Case Management states, "We have had great feedback from consumers and their families as we have started the Person Centered Planning and Thinking process. It's remarkable to see individuals finding their voice and the courage to let others know what is important to them. We look forward to saturating our entire planning process with this concept to empower the individuals we work with."


