Scary!

Have you seen the scary Halloween costumes in stores yet! It's that time of year when costumes are out and folks are decorating. Some of this can be scary to Infants and Toddlers. While it may be tempting to scare your child to get something funny on video, scaring your infant or toddler intentionally is not the best idea.

For Infants and Toddlers they really depend on their caregivers to keep them safe and help them regulate their emotions. When they act afraid, they depend on us to assure them that we will keep them safe. We also want to assure them that it is ok to cry and be afraid, and we will check things out for them. You don't want to belittle their emotions and say "Don't Be Scared". Instead say "I can see that that costume is scaring you. I will keep you same and check it out." If you then want to show them that it's just a costume and they stop fussing, move them closer and ask them "do you want to touch it?" If they continue to act afraid, move them away while telling them "we won't go over by that because it scares you."


When a young child is afraid but can't tell you about it, give them the words to use, even if they can't yet use the words. You might say "That big gorilla mask is scary! I'm going to walk over here so you aren't too close to it." For young children you don't need to convince them to not be afraid, instead, just show them that you will keep them safe.

If you are taking young ones out where there will be children in costumes that might be scary, plan on adjusting your schedule to meet the needs of the youngest child. You may need to go in a group with more than one adult so that older children can be out longer and younger children can go home.

Young children can be especially afraid of seeing their parents in a mask or makeup, even if it's something you don't usually think of as scary. Sometimes it helps if they see you put the makeup on, but even then it can be confusing and scary to young children. If you have a young one who is sensitive, this might be the year to just wear a funny hat instead of a full costume.
